Maths – Telling the Time

How are Victorian houses different to modern houses?

Non-computer task: Dolls houses were very popular in Victorian times. They were like miniature models of houses for dolls to live in. Can you design a dolls house based on a Victorian house?

Remember the front of the house would normally open up showing the rooms inside. If you want to, you could try to make one from cardboard/a shoe box, but you might need help.

English: Writing

Write a description of a Victorian house.

Write some sentences to describe a typical Victorian house. When were they built? What do they look like? How are they different to a typical modern house? Do they have different rooms to the ones we have today? What do you think it would be like to live in a house like that in Victorian times?
Don't forget to write in sentences with capital letters and full stops. Challenge yourself to include a conjunction like 'because', 'if' or 'when'.

Science

Can I find out what effect a surface has on how far a marble can roll?

The aim of this experiment is to find out whether the texture or feel of a surface will affect the distance rolled by a marble, and if so, on which ramp surface a marble will roll the furthest.

You will need:

- A ramp: a book or piece of wood is fine.
- Different materials to cover the ramp: a tea-towel, sandpaper, greaseproof paper, paper towel, cling film, bubble wrap and foil are ideal, but anything that you choose could work.
- A marble.

Before you complete the experiment, decide whether you think changing the surface material will change how far the marble rolls. Can you decide on which one it might go the furthest/shortest distances? **We have posted a guide to the experiment & a table for results.**
Challenge: Can you make a graph to show the results?

Find a Victorian building to draw.

It could be a famous building, like Osborne House, which was built for Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, or it could be an old school near you. The Victorians built a lot of buildings, as it was a time when Great Britain was one of the richest countries in the world. Many of the buildings are still standing, because they were very well-built, although some were destroyed in World War II.
