Maths

LO: I can multiply and divide with fractions.

Computer-based activities

Consolidate:

Non-computer based activities

Consolidate:

1. I am making dinner for my family. Each person will have 2 sausages. There are 4 people in my family. How many sausages will I need?

We can draw the problem or we can write it as an equation like this: $2 \times 4 = 8$

2. Now, each sausage is cut into 4 equal parts. Each person only eats ¾ of each sausage. How much sausage does each person eat?

Again we can draw the problem or write it as a number sentence. (Remember, the multiplication sign means 'of' in this case.)

 $\frac{3}{4} \times 2 = 1\frac{1}{2}$

Answer the following questions:

- What was the climate like in Greece?
- What types of work did people do in the time of the ancient Greeks?

- What is a chiton?
- What types of toys did children play with? Were any similar to those we use today?
- What types of foods did people eat at this point in history?

Science

Question: Ask question: Why do shadows change as the day progresses?

Home learning task: Choose a bright day for this task. Place a tall object outside. This object should not be moved during the experiment. Measure the length of the shadow every hour, from 9am to 3pm, and record in a simple table. Whenever you take a measurement, place a marker on the ground to show where the shadow was at that time. What do you notice? Describe the two main changes to the shadow. Then explain why this happens using scientific language.

Can you create your own fraction question? Can you demonstrate it practically to a member of your family - can they answer it? Can you write the equation to solve it?

Core:

I cook 3 pizzas and cut them into fifths. I eat 4 pieces. Mum has the same and so does my brother.

1. How much did the 3 of us eat altogether? Draw this - use either pictures or bar models.

4 fifths
$$x 3 = or 4/5 x 3 =$$

2. Explain how this calculation fits the question and then calculate and show the answer.

Again, draw this - it will help show your thinking and check your answer.

3. How much pizza was left over?

Draw this and then write this as a fraction.

Extend (do the core task first):

4. My brother and I want to share the remaining pizza. My brother says

'There are 3/3 remaining so we get half a pizza each'.

Is my brother correct? Explain. (This should include one drawing.)

How much is actually remaining?

5. If there was 3/5 remaining, how much pizza would my brother and I get?

Explain and show your method (this will probably include a bar model).

6. My brother is still hungry!

He finds 6/8 of a bag of sweets in the cupboard which has 36 sweets in it, but the whole family want to share them. What fraction of the whole bag does each of the four family members get?

Explain and show your method.

Writing

TASK:

Create a piece of writing based on your research. You can choose either:

- To write a range of short diary entries from the perspective of a person in ancient Greek times – choose to write as an adult or child, a rich or poor (they could have a specific job / role e.g. farmer, soldier, actor etc.)
- To write a letter / postcard to a family member from the perspective of a child living in ancient Greece – talk about you day, what you will be doing over the coming days etc.
- To write a non-chronological report about daily life in ancient Greece

Extend challenge:

Choose one of the following options:

- Write diary entries from contrasting perspectives (for example, rich / poor, soldier / slave)
- Write a letter from the perspective of an ancient Greek to an audience of your choice – use the correct level of formality and that the reader can hear the voice of the writer (think about the greater depth examples of writing)

History

This week, you are going to explore the Olympics, something you may have already researched for History.

TASK 1 – Research and Explore:

Find out as much as you can about the Olympics. You can present your work however you wish – this could be with or without a computer.

TASK 2 – Olympic Event:

As we are all having to stay at home at the moment, what fun sporting activity can you come up with that we could all take part in from the safety of our own homes?

Tell me about the best event you can come up with. You could:

- Make a video explaining / demonstrating your sport
- Create a set of instructions explaining how to take part in your event
